Seventeen Alberta Communities Benefit From \$12 Million in Green Infrastructure Investments

Edmonton, Alberta... Seventeen communities in East-Central Alberta will benefit from nearly \$12 million invested in 20 municipal infrastructure projects through the Infrastructure Canada-Alberta Program (ICAP).

Anne McLellan, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, on behalf of the Stephen Owen, Minister of Western Economic Diversification and Minister of State (Sport) made the announcement Aug. 3 with Dr. Lyle Oberg, Alberta Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation.

"The Government of Canada is committed to improving Alberta's communities by investing in projects that protect our environment and improve the quality of life in our communities," said McLellan. "Each of the 20 green infrastructure projects we're announcing today is about governments working together and with Albertans to support local solutions to local challenges."

The majority of the projects announced today will improve drinking water, wastewater, storm water, and firefighting systems or improve energy efficiency in municipal buildings.

"These projects will improve the quality of life for residents and represent what's important to individual Alberta communities," said Oberg. "We will continue to work with municipal and federal governments to respond to the needs of Alberta communities."

Project highlights include construction of a rural water supply pipeline in Kneehill County, provision of water services to additional residents in Starland County, and the implementation of sanitary sewer services in the community of Rosedale, near Drumheller.

Under ICAP, the federal and provincial governments provide up to two-thirds of the funding for eligible project costs. Partnering communities or private partners provide the remaining project funding. In Alberta, ICAP is implemented by Western Economic Diversification Canada and Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation, and is administered by a joint secretariat. The federal and provincial governments will invest over \$3.4 million each towards the \$12 million announced today. The proponents will invest the remaining \$5.15 million.

To date, 731 projects have been announced in Alberta under this partnership program. With these projects, ICAP has exceeded its target of directing at least \$508 million in federal, provincial and municipal funding toward municipal infrastructure in urban and rural communities across the province.

The ICAP Management Committee approves the projects and is composed of representatives from the governments of Canada and Alberta, the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) and the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties (AAMD&C).

"The Infrastructure Canada-Alberta Program is a good example of a working partnership between all three levels of government," said Dorothy Moore on behalf of the AUMA. "The infrastructure needs of municipalities have never been greater. ICAP's versatile three-way partnership addresses infrastructure needs in all sizes of municipalities."

"The funding support offered by ICAP allows our member municipalities to take on needed infrastructure improvements," said Eugene Wauters on behalf of the AAMD&C. "Infrastructure is a high priority for municipal districts and counties."

The Infrastructure Canada-Alberta Program agreement was signed Oct. 10, 2000.

Alberta Fact Sheet

Partnership Program

- The Infrastructure Canada-Alberta Program (ICAP) is a partnership involving federal, provincial and municipal governments that also allows for private-sector participation. All three levels of government played an important part in the design of this program.
- Under ICAP, the federal and provincial governments can provide up to two-thirds of the funding for eligible costs. Partnering communities or private partners in the program provide the remaining project funding. For the 731 projects and \$576.4 million approved to-date since June 8, 2001, federal and provincial contributions total approximately \$323.15 million.
- In Alberta, the program is implemented by Western Economic Diversification Canada and Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation, and is administered by a joint secretariat.

Grassroots Driven

- ICAP is designed with a bottom-up approach. Accordingly, municipalities play an important role in the program. The majority of projects will address local infrastructure needs identified by the municipalities.
- The federal and provincial governments may also propose projects to ensure that regional projects involving more than one municipality are not overlooked.

Program Priorities

- ICAP's **first priority** is "green" municipal infrastructure. Green infrastructure includes projects related to water and wastewater systems, water management, solid waste management and recycling, and capital expenditures to retrofit or improve the energy efficiency of buildings and facilities owned by local municipalities.
- The ICAP agreement specifies that a minimum 40 per cent of the total value of all approved projects must be invested in green municipal infrastructure.

Secondary priorities

include local transportation, cultural and recreational facilities, infrastructure supporting tourism, rural and remote telecommunications, high-speed Internet access for local public institutions and affordable housing.

• To ensure the infrastructure needs of rural communities are considered, a minimum 26 per cent of total approved costs for all projects in Alberta must be invested in projects proposed by rural municipalities.

Replace 52nd Avenue Lift Station \$119,000

Installing a new lift station will improve protection for residents by reducing risk of flood damage. This project will also improve the reliability of services to the community's water and wastewater treatment facilities.

Water System Upgrades - 2004 \$1,647

This project will extend the municipal water line further along Birkett Street, supplying area residents with higher quality drinking water.

Improvements to the sewage lagoon will provide local residents with higher quality wastewater treatment service. Elements of this project include reconstructing the inside and outside slopes, widening the top berm

Ervick Junction Water Supply Project \$589,750

This project will extend an existing municipal water line to an industrial park in Ervick Junction that provides services to farmers. It will encourage greater economic growth and sustainable development in the region.

Water and Wastewater Services \$201,160

Extending infrastructure services to a subdivision in the Village will provide families with access to higher quality drinking water and improved wastewater disposal services. New water meters will encourage residents to monitor water consumption.

Sportex Energy Efficiency Upgrades \$47,093

The Village will improve energy efficiency in the building and install a new ice control system. These upgrades are expected to reduce energy loss in the facility.

The Town will install a new sanitary sewer main to connect the community of Rosedale to Drumheller's wastewater treatment plant, providing improved wastewater service to residents.

Three Hills West Water Supply Pipeline \$3,512,700

The County will design and build a rural water supply pipeline from the Town of Three Hills west to the communities of Sunnyslope and Torrington. Municipal water service will be extended to local area

residents, providing access to higher quality drinking water.

Water and Sewer Upgrades \$126,533

The Village will replace a deteriorating cement watermain with a plastic pipeline, thus improving water pressure and reliability for residents. This project will also upgrade outdated sanitary and storm sewer connections.

Alberta Street Watermain Replacement \$77,040

Upgrading the watermain along Alberta Street will provide families with higher quality drinking water. The Village will also install new services and hydrants to improve firefighting capacity.

Water Distribution Pump Station Upgrades \$454,429

The Town of Oyen will upgrade mechanical and electrical equipment in the local water distribution pump station to provide for the increased water capacity needed to meet current and future water use and firefighting needs. Upgrades will include the replacement of three pumps and a control valve, installation of a backup power generator, and the resultant pump station renovations.

Balancing Lagoon Upgrade at Wastewater Treatment Plant \$160,500

This project will transform the existing anaerobic treatment facility into a modern balancing lagoon to better control flow into the new wastewater treatment plant. Upgrades include the installation of new pipes, relocation of the intake screens and reconstruction of the interior berms. These improvements will provide residents with access to improved wastewater treatment service.

Installation of a standby generator at the water treatment plant to ensure a continuing and secure supply of potable water to the town residents.
