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- ▶ **What are you going to do?**

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- ▶ ARES members have also taken additional training in net control, message handling, radio procedures, effective communications and ICS100 or higher.

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- ▶ We all know how our radios work.
- ▶ Most importantly, we know how to talk to each other when on one else can.

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- ▶ High River had no reliable communications until ARES established a link from the AEMA POC in Edmonton to both the EOC and hospital in High River.
- ▶ This was done within 2 hours of our activation by the POC.

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- ▶ Provide trained operators to your agency on your equipment freeing up trained first responders to handle other, more urgent, tasks.
- ▶ Or any other communication task that your agency may need us to handle
