Brooks Aqueduct

National and Provincial Historic Site

The Brooks Aqueduct was built between 1912 and 1914 as part of an irrigation system to provide water to the arid farmlands of southeastern Alberta. Visit and marvel at this enormous engineered concrete structure, standing as a testament to the hardy agricultural pioneers who developed the region.

Father Lacombe Chapel

PROVINCIAL HISTORIC SITE



Frog Lake NATIONAL AND PROVINCIAL HISTORIC SITE

The relationship between government and First Nations in Canada has always been complicated and sometimes, tension resulted in violence. The events in and around Frog Lake in 1885 took the form of tragic battles between police, Métis and Cree tribes. Walk the trails and with the help of interpretive signs, learn about and contemplate this complex period of Alberta's history.

Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump is a UNESCO-designated World Heritage Site that preserves and interprets over 8,000 years of Plains Buffalo culture. Through vast landscapes, exhibits, and diverse programming, learn about the cultural significance of this cliff to the Plains People.

Okotoks Erratic PROVINCIAL HISTORIC SITE

Transported by glacial ice far from its place of origin, "The Big Rock" is part of the Foothills Erratics Train, a group of rocks carried along the front of the Rocky Mountains and dropped as the ice melted some 10,000 years ago. This is a significant spiritual site for the Blackfoot people, and it is the Blackfoot word for rock, okatok, that gave the erratic its name.

Provincial Archives of Alberta

The Provincial Archives of Alberta preserves and makes available for research both private and government records related to the history and culture of our province. The collection includes over 2.4 million photographs, 62 kilometres of textual records, thousands of hours of sound, film and video recordings, as well as books, newspapers, maps and architectural drawings.
